Hand and Arm Signals



In a production situation, the hand and arm signals of the stage manager are simply a visual extension of the director's commands. Most of these gestures were developed during the early days of radio. A few have been altered somewhat for use in television production. The following examples show the signals most generally in use today.

TELEVISION HAND SIGNALS

Ready to start show Ready to record Quiet on the set DESCRIPTION

Stage Manager raises hand in air, with fingers pointing upward


YOU'RE ON TAKE YOUR CUE



Start talking Talent is on the air

Points to performer or live camera

GET CLOSER TOGETHER




Talent, performers or reporters too far apart Get closer together Get closer to object of interest

Stage Manager plays an invisible accordian, bringing palms together repeatedly

GET FARTHER APART




MEANING

Talent too close together

DESCRIPTION


Stage Manager moves hands together, back to back, then spreads them sharply apart

STOP THAT'S FAR ENOUGH



Traffic cop's signal, similar to standby signal

TALK TO THIS CAMERA CAMERA CHANGE



Changing cameras

Stage Manager swings hands through a wide arc from camera that is on the air to the camera that will be on the air

GET CLOSER TO THE MICROPHONE OR SPEAK LOUDER




Audio level too low Get closer to the mike Stage Manager moves hands toward himself/ herself or toward the mike

GET FURTHER FROM MICROPHONE OR SPEAK LOWER



Opposite of above

KEEP TALKING STRETCH



Too much time left Fill in

Extend thumb and forefinger horizontally, move them like the beak of a bird

STRETCH IT OUT SLOW DOWN




DESCRIPTION

Talking too fast

Move hands as if pulling taffy apart or stretching rubber bands





Talking too slow Running out of time

Move forefinger in circ'es

ON THE NOSE PROGRAM ON TIME



Program is running right on time, no problems


Stage Manager touches nose with forefinger

O.K. ALL IS WELL YOUR POSITION IS FINE



Well done Stay right there Form an "O" with thumb and forefinger with other three fingers raised

FIVE MINUTES TO GO TWO MINUTES TO GO ONE MINUTE TO GO




MEANING

Time cues to end of show



Raise hand with corresponding number of fingers spread apart or raise flash cards



Time to end of segment or end of show

Cross forefingers or forearms at midpoint




10 seconds left Come to a conclusion

Rocking or shaking of clenched fist




Stage Manager slashes own throat with fore finger or edge of hand
